Simple and Perfect Verb Tenses



There are three simple verb tenses.

- Present tense places a condition or action in the present.
 Example: She walks to school every day.
- Past tense places a condition or action in the past.
 Example: She walked to school every day last week.
 - Future tense places a condition or action in the future.

Example: She will walk to school tomorrow.

There are also three perfect verb tenses.

 Present perfect tense tells about a condition or action that started in the past and is continuing or has just been completed.

Example: She has walked to school each day lately.

 Past perfect tense tells about a condition or action that was completed before another past action began.

Example: She had walked to school twice before she twisted her ankle.

 Future perfect tense tells about a condition or action that will be completed before a specific time in the future.

Example: She will have walked ten miles by the end of the week.
